Georgia Students Experience Nation's Capital

he Washington Youth Tour experience gives delegates an opportunity to visit as many as 25 of Washington, D.C.'s most historic sites, as well as participate in team-building activities and events during which they can learn more about one another and meet delegates from throughout the United States.

Slade Holland of Lyons, Brie Jackson-Buchanon of Swainsboro and Noah Varn of Vidalia were selected to represent Altamaha EMC in 2024.

White House

One of the first stops on the weeklong Youth Tour was a photo opportunity at the White House. The location at 1600 Pennsylvania Ave. NW in

Washington, D.C., was selected by former President George Washington in 1791 as the future home of our nation's president. There are 132 rooms, 35 bathrooms and six levels in the White House, and, on average, 6,000 people visit it daily.

Library of Congress

The Library of Congress was founded in 1800 and is the oldest federal cultural institution in the nation.

It is the largest library in the world, with millions of items in a variety of formats. It includes international collections, a law library, rare books and manuscripts, and audiovisual collections.

Riverboat Cruise

Delegates had an amazing time on the Washington Youth Tour Riverboat Cruise, which allowed delegates to get a picturesque view of the landscape along the Potomac River. During the nearly three-hour cruise, Georgia students were joined by WYT delegates from North Dakota and Montana.

George Washington's Mount Vernon Located about 13 miles outside Washington, D.C.,

Located about 13 miles outside Washington, D.C., George Washington's Mount Vernon is the former home of the United States' first president and his wife, Martha. The estate features a mansion and dozens of historic outbuildings, a blacksmith shop, farm and wharf.

During their visit, WYT delegates toured the grounds, checked out the inside of Washington's mansion, visited the tombs of George and Martha Washington, listened to historic reenactors describe the former president's farming practices and enjoyed lunch at the famed Mount Vernon Inn Restaurant.

Presidential and War Memorials

There are seven presidential memorials and nearly 20 war memorials in Washington, D.C. These include the Jefferson Memorial, Lincoln Memorial, Korean War Veterans Memorial and the National World War II Memorial.

Georgia's delegation learned the history of many memorials from experienced tour guides, snapped photos along the Tidal Basin near the National Mall and at memorial parks, and read Father's Day messages left by family members at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial.

Arlington National Cemetery

Established in 1864, Arlington National Cemetery encompasses 639 acres and contains the remains of service members from both world wars and the conflict in Korea.

Located within the cemetery is the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, where delegates attended a special wreath-laying ceremony honoring U.S. military members and veterans.

A ltamaha EMC's Washington Youth Tour delegates are selected through a comprehensive application process. Juniors and seniors from high schools in our seven-county service area are eligible to apply. School counselors from these counties nominate students to participate in the program. Nominated students first go through a preliminary interview with Altamaha EMC's Washington Youth Tour coordinator. Finalists are then invited to a second round of interviews, evaluated by a panel of judges from three different electric membership cooperatives in Georgia. Ultimately, our Washington Youth Tour director and judges select the top three students to represent Altamaha EMC on the Youth Tour.

Slade Holland

Slade is a senior at Toombs County High School, where he is an active member of Beta Club and the FBLA. Recently, he attended the FBLA Leadership Conference and competed in Business Law. A first-degree black belt in karate, Slade now dedicates his time as a karate instructor. He also tutors students after school and participates in his church's men's ministry.
