




Energy Efficiency Tip of the Month

Looking for additional ways to save energy this summer? Your laundry room is a great play to start. Wash clothes with cold water, which can cut one load's energy use by more than half. Your washing maching will use the same amount of energy no matter the size of the clothes load, so fill it up when you can. When drying clothes, separate the heavier cottons. Loads will dry faster and more evenly if you separate heavier cottons like linens and towels from your lightweight clothing. *Source: Dept. of Energy*

Pecan Upside Down Bundt

INGREDIENTS:

box yellow cake mix
 pack instant vanilla pudding
 eggs
 cup oil
 cup water
 cup light brown sugar
 stick melted butter
 cup whole pecans
 cup chopped pecans

DIRECTIONS:

Mix all the ingredients together in a bowl, except for the butter and sugar. Set this mixture aside. Take a bundt pan, square pan, or oblong pan, and generously spray it with baking spray to prevent sticking. Melt the butter and pour it into the prepared pan. Sprinkle a layer of brown sugar over the melted butter, and then evenly distribute the pecans on top. Pour the cake batter over the brown sugar and pecans. Preheat your oven to 350°F (175°C). Bake the cake for 35 to 42 minutes. If using a Bundt pan, it may take around 45 minutes. Once the cake is baked allow it to cool in the pan before turning it out onto a plate. Serve and enjoy!

Note: It's important to thoroughly cool the cake before removing it from the pan to ensure it retains its shape.
