



hree local students have been chosen to represent Altamaha EMC on the 2018 Washington Youth Tour (WYT), an all-expense paid leadership experience sponsored by electric membership cooperatives across the country. Cody Masterman-Smith of Robert Toombs Christian Academy, Adam Morris of Montgomery County High School and Elliot Sammons of Vidalia Heritage Academy will attend the tour June 7-14.

For more than 50 years, the WYT has helped promising student leaders become exceptional young adults. The WYT was established with this purpose in mind – to inspire the next generation of leaders. The tour offers opportunities for students to meet policy makers, tour historic monuments and participate in leadership experiences all while

making new friends from across the state and the nation. Teens on the tour are challenged to consider the part they play in government and the cooperative movement, to become engaged citizens and to learn about careers in public service.

"These students represent the next generation of accomplished, involved leaders communities and state," says Tammye Vaughn, Altamaha EMC's WYT Coordinator. "The chance to experience the nation's capital, to see monuments and memorials honoring those who made sacrifices so we can live and worship in a free society, as well as surround themselves with other exceptional students who come from different parts of the state and country is a rare opportunity."

The 112 teen-delegates will gather in Atlanta to kick off the

tour, spending time getting to know each other before departing for Washington D.C.


When the group arrives in D.C., participants tour historic locations like Mount Vernon, explore museums and monuments and meet with their elected officials to discuss the issues that are important back home. Georgia's delegation will convene with more than 1,800 youth representing cooperatives across the nation and have the opportunity to mingle with peers from other states and exchange views concerning local and national issues.

Sidney Spell, Assistant Principal at Toombs County High School, was chosen as one of two Georgia educators to serve as a chaperone for this year's tour.

RECIPES

Chicken Pot Pie Crescent Roll

1 bag (10 oz.) frozen microwavable mixed vegetables
2 cups shredded cooked chicken
1 can (10.75 oz.) condensed cream of chicken soup
1 tablespoon milk
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
2 cans (8 oz. each) refrigerated crescent dinner rolls

Place oven rack in center position. Heat oven to 375°F. Cook frozen vegetables in microwave as directed on bag. Cool 1 to 2 minutes. Pour into medium bowl. Add chicken, soup, milk, salt

and pepper; stir to combine. Set aside. Separate 1 can of dough into 4 rectangles. On ungreased large cookie sheet, arrange rectangles perpendicular to each other to form a cross. Corners of one side should touch while leaving a square space in the center. Separate dough from second can into 4 more rectangles. Arrange rectangles into an "X" that overlaps





the cross, leaving an open circle in the center. Carefully spoon chicken mixture around center of dough; shape into a ring leaving about 1/2 inch of dough in the center. Pull overhanging dough from outer edge towards center and over filling. Tuck and pinch dough under middle. Bake 20-22 minutes or until golden brown and thoroughly heated. Remove from cookie sheet to serving platter or cutting board. Cool 10 minutes before slicing.
